Yardley Early Help Steering Group update



An update from conversations in the Yardley Early Help and Birmingham Forward Steps (BFS) Steering Group:

- We have started talking about Family Hubs in Yardley as I'm sure many partners have as well. This is going to be an ongoing agenda item for the Steering group. Most recently looking at the 24 key services and where we have gaps as a Network. We want to be as representative of these services and the community as we have mentioned before we would like to see more community groups and faith groups from Yardley join us. If you feel your organisation, or an organisation you know, should be part of these conversations for Yardley and join the Steering Group please contact Tom thomas.gillam@barnardos.org.uk.
- We know from Yardley's Family Connect Form data that the key themes for families in Yardley are food poverty/cost of living, housing, SEND and wellbeing (including child and adult Mental health). These themes overlap with learning via our BFS partners – where poverty, infant mortality and SEND have been raised as important themes. They match too with conversation we have at Network meetings, and from joining in different partner's events. Whatever we set out will be in addition to citywide priorities – around SEND, Education and Domestic Abuse. Does this match what you see? Are we missing something? Please email us on earlyhelpyardley@barnardos.org.uk
- In response to this learning, we have agreed that network meetings should be themed around these topics in 15-30 minutes presentation slot and/or a separate event/workshop/training where we can potentially interact with professionals and/or families in and around Yardley. You should notice this when updated Network meeting invites come out for the next few months.

Can your organisation provide a Warm Welcome in Warm Spaces to the citizens this winter?



Birmingham City Council given government go ahead to introduce a Selective Licensing Scheme in Birmingham

Birmingham City Council has been granted permission by the Department of Levelling Up, Housing and Communities under the Housing Act 2004 to introduce a Selective Licensing Scheme for all private rented properties in 25 wards in the city, delivered through a team of 130 staff.

The Council have launched a licensing scheme for private sector houses in 25 wards including: Small Heath, South Yardley, Sparkhill, Tyseley and Hay Mills, Yardley West and Stechford.

The scheme will target wards where the private rented sector is above 20% of properties and there are high levels of deprivation and/or crime. The scheme will be the largest in the UK covering between 40,000 - 50,000 properties. It will last five years and come into force on 5 June 2023.

Councillor Sharon Thompson, Cabinet Member for Housing & Homelessness for Birmingham City Council (BCC), said: 'The Selective Licensing Scheme will allow BCC to work with all landlords to drive up standards across all private rented sector properties and join up with other services such as the police to tackle issues such as the high levels of crime that have blighted these wards for too long. Improving standards in the longer term will lead to safer and more stable communities, enabling more tenants to fulfil their potential especially children.'

HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC) is encouraging families across the UK to not miss the opportunity for government-funded help towards their childcare costs.



Families could save up to £2,000 a year towards their childcare costs to help pay for October half-term holiday clubs and wraparound care during the school terms, reminds HMRC.

More than 391,000 families saved money on their childcare costs in June 2022, worth a total of £41.6 million in top-up payments, and HMRC is urging thousands of other families to not miss the chance to save up to £500 every 3 months, or £1,000 if their child is disabled.
